*Please remember the student dress code when dressing your child during the last few hot days of summer. Girl's shorts should be measured with a standard index card length wise from their knees.



Meaning and Spelling Vocabulary

Ob stin ate ly (closed, closed, unaccented, open) is an adverb that means not willing to change your opinion or actions. Sometimes people act obstinately even when they know they are wrong. The adjective is obstinate.

Waft (closed) is a verb that means to move lightly about, carried by a wind or wave. Smells wafts from the kitchen when someone is baking. We can add our verb suffixes with no spelling change: wafted, wafting

In cin er a tor (closed, closed, rcontrol, open, rcontrol) is a noun that means a machine that burns garbage. Apartment buildings used to have incinerators. The verb form is incinerate. It means to burn.

Pan der (closed, closed) is a verb that means to encourage the bad habits of someone else. If your friend is doing something that you know is wrong but you laugh, you are pandering. We can add verb suffixes with no spelling change: pandered, pandering. Panderer is the noun form.

Gal lant ly (closed, closed, open) is an adverb that means polite and attentive. I like it when people act gallantly in the cafeteria by helping classmates. Gallant is the adjective.

Prec ip ice (closed, closed, closed) is a noun that means a steep or high part of a mountain. If you climb to the precipice, you usually have a great view.
